2006 PRESIDENT'S RIFLE SILHOUETTE MATCHES

Sunday, January 22nd, Hassayampa Rod & Gun Club hosted the 2006 ASR&PA President's matches at the Ben Avery Shooting Facility. Bright sun, clear blue skies, light wind, and temperatures in the mid sixties, provided shooters with perfect conditions for these matches. 89 rifles were entered in the smallbore match and 49 rifles were entered in the highpower match. Shooters came from Colorado, New Mexico, California, Ohio, and around Arizona.

2009 A YEAR TO REMEMBER, ALREADY

The 100th anniversary of ASRPA and the NRA annual meeting coming to Phoenix. Now is when we need to start planning and working on making 2009 extra special. We are looking for folks to start work on these two events. It is not too early to start lining up volunteers and coordinators for the many projects. We will be forming a committee to get the ball rolling on these two great events. Our next board meeting, 11 March 2006, 10:00 am at BASF. Join us!

BASF; it never ends. Two developments are very important to the future of BASF. Proposition 1 and 4 of the Phoenix Bond Election and Jennifer Martin to the Game & Fish Commission.

Your Board has approved supporting Props. 1 and 4 of the Phoenix city bond election on March 14th. The approximately 11 million dollars would go to purchase of lands immediately to the north of the range, with 3 million of that to manage and improve the clay target center, pending of course, the G&F Commission agreeing to that. The current management lease runs out very soon. The shotgun ranges would be the economic engine for the overall range. Yes, any bond issues has to be paid by the taxpayers, that will never change. But, for the first time in my memory, there has been something in a bond that will directly benefit gun owners and shooters.

Also directly related to the future of BASF, is the open seat on the G&F Commission. Early on, we met with Nancy Lewis, a long time friend and very active sportswoman. The Board after meeting with her, voted to endorse her for the seat. NRA also supported her. Sadly, she did not get the nomination.

Jennifer Martin, who was nominated, asked to meet with us and discuss issues and listen to our concerns.

PHOENIX, ARIZONA CHOSEN TO HOST NRA ANNUAL MEETINGS AND EXHIBITS IN 2009

Friday, February 24, 2006

(PHOENIX, AZ)

Today, the nation's oldest civil rights group, the National Rifle Association (NRA), announced it would hold its 138th Annual Meetings and Exhibits at the Greater Phoenix Convention Center on May 15-17, 2009, in Phoenix, Arizona.

In a press conference held at the Hyatt Regency Phoenix, NRA President and Arizona resident, Sandy Froman, told reporters, "Today, I am thrilled to announce that the NRA Site Selection Committee has chosen Phoenix to be the host city of the 2009 NRA Annual Meetings. We look forward to hosting 55,000 to 65,000 NRA members, hunters and gun owners in my beloved home state of Arizona." Joining Ms. Froman at the press conference were NRA Executive Vice President Wayne LaPierre, Phoenix Mayor Phil Gordon, Arizona State Senate President Ken Bennett, Arizona House Speaker James Weiers and other local dignitaries.

She continued, "I told my fellow committee members that while Phoenix is well-known for our warm weather, we are indeed a very cool city...and I'm glad they listened. I am confident that our new Phoenix Convention Center will have the latest technology and services, making the facility both efficient and user-friendly."

Wayne LaPierre added, "After nearly 15 years, we're pleased to return to this great city to celebrate freedom and our 138th Annual Meetings and Exhibits, and we look forward to utilizing the excellent new convention center."

In his remarks, Mayor Phil Gordon said, "We're pleased to welcome the National Rifle Association to Phoenix in 2009. When we undertook the \$600 million expansion of the Phoenix Convention Center, it was with this type of opportunity in mind. The NRA conference is a valued and highly-sought piece of convention business and we are proud of

the choice the Association has made for its 2009 meeting." He added, "With our venue expansion and our elevation into North America's list of Top-20 convention centers, we are excited to host the NRA and its 55,000 - 65,000 members."

The \$600 million Greater Phoenix Convention Center expansion project is due to be complete and open for business in January of 2009. Next May, Phase One of the expansion will debut 158,000 square feet of new meeting and exhibit space, including a 21,000-sq.-ft. conference center on the second level. In 2009, a total of more than 900,000 square feet of meeting and exhibit space will be available at the center.

LaPierre concluded, "Our staff has worked with the Greater Phoenix Convention & Visitors Bureau and I would like to thank them for their enthusiasm and excitement to host NRA's 2009 Annual Meetings & Exhibits. With this fantastic location, our meeting in Phoenix promises to be one of our best events yet."

Established in 1871, the National Rifle Association is America's oldest civil rights and sportsmen's group. Four million members strong, NRA continues its mission to uphold Second Amendment rights and to advocate enforcement of existing laws against violent offenders to reduce crime. Several of us have met with her and also had several conversations. After discussion, and a vote, your Board is supporting her nomination before the State Senate. NRA, after meeting with her is also supporting her. This is going to be a battle in the Senate, as some factions are totally opposed to her, mainly it would seem, because she is not their guy. Call, write, e-mail your state senator asap.

BASF tour: Several of us had a tour of proposed G&F Hq. site with Dir. Shroufe and G&F staff. This is 40 acres just to the south of the shotgun ranges. It would have been logical direction for expansion of those ranges. Had quite a bit of discussion over site. They are correct in that no existing range would be affected, but it is 40 acres that can't be used for range. Meanwhile, the SE corner will sit unused. A lot of rumors going around about BASF, which don't serve anyone's interest. Contact us when you hear something off the wall, we will try to get facts.

Opportunities at ASRPA What we need, what we really, really, need. And as soon as possible. A Membership Secretary, someone to handle memberships, and can work with the computer program database thingy. It shouldn't take up too much time per month. A volunteer position as are all the rest. Please contact myself or Shelley Sansom for further info.

BOOKKEEPER – We need a person with bookkeeping experience to help bring us up to date. Someone who would take over this task, or could set up a system and train a volunteer to do it. We are not a big buck organization, so after initial work of transition, it should also be a low time effort. This is something we really need help with. Contact me for more info.

LEGISLATIVE STUFF – Washington DC remains relatively quiet for now. Something to give thanks for. Congress Congressman Rick Renzi is working actively to help get us a range for northern AZ. All you folks up there need to contact his office with support.

Former State Representative Randy Graf (A+) is

running for Congress in Dist. 8. He is a good guy and will be running against some people who have not been our friends. I would encourage folks to take interest in this one early. With all our struggles with fed land management agencies, a good Congressman can make all the difference. Just ask the good folks at Tucson Rod & Gun.

Looks like all the remaining Congressmen will be running for reelection.

STATE. – Legislature is back in session. Just a couple of bad bills introduced, and they never got heard. It really makes a difference when you get active in elections. Some good bills moving. involving your right to defend yourself and your home, (the "Castle Doctrine" bills) and restoring the burden of proof in self defense cases. Yes, if you defend yourself today, the burden of proof is on you to prove it was self defense, not on the state to prove it was not The criminal prosecutors are funded with millions of dollars. It will cost you at least \$10,000 to get a lawyer, and another \$50 to 100k to go to trial. Can you afford that? Public Defender? Good bye and good luck. Among the bills are HB2392, SB 1145, and SCR 1001. Contacting your state legislators with support really helps.

There are also several bills addressing CCW. Among them HB 2074.

City Elections. A lot of them coming up soon. However, do to a lack of resources, we are not able to cover them as in years past. This is where future mayors, legislators, governors, congresspersons come from. I would like to see members take initiative in their own towns, ask questions, let us know what the candidates tell you. We have some sample questionnaires available.

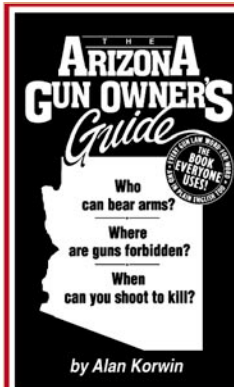

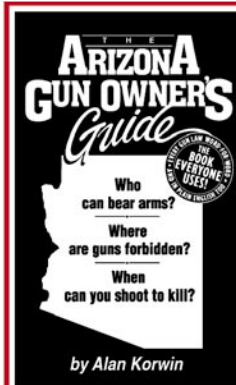

OUR FIRST HIGH POWER MATCH

It began innocently enough. I joined the Annie Oakley Sure Shots in September (2nd and 4th Thursday nights out at Ben Avery) and was happily blazing my way through target after target with a borrowed .22 rifle.

One evening I noticed a sign-up sheet for women who were interested in starting up a high-power rifle team, and after being assured that beginners were welcome – in fact, encouraged - I signed up. The goal was to have an all women's team compete in the Washington's Birthday Match at Ben Avery on February 12, quite possibly the first all-women's team in the 114-year history of this event!

I figured it would be a fun learning experience, but little did I know . . . I showed up to our first practice with about 20-25 other women and fired 3 whole

shots with an AR-15. All of them hit the target – and right then I knew I was in this for the duration.

We arranged some practice times and began our quest for knowledge in all things high-power. We were amazed as “little black thingies” became technical terms, and we realized milestone after milestone - learning to adjust the sights for wind conditions, getting most of our hits not just “on paper” but “in the black”. We learned how to pull targets and the ins and outs of being ‘in the pits’ and giving good target service. We now “talk firearms” with the best of the best. And the smell of gunpowder in the morning – let's just say we're addicted!

We borrowed and shared AR's wherever and whenever we could. Our families and friends were kind enough to schedule activities around our practices and were even tapped to pull targets for us. They quickly became experts! We had help from EVERYWHERE in the form of corporate donations, equipment loans, and especially a few crazy instructors (you know who you are) who gave us their time, knowledge and PATIENCE at every practice.

What a team! We ended up with 12 very committed members – enough for 3 teams. Only

2 or 3 of the 12 had ever fired an AR-15 before November. Moms, grandmas, businesswomen, teachers, retirees – ranging in age from 20-something to 70-something. One began practicing in a wheelchair with a broken leg, one had hip replacement issues, and one nearly broke her tailbone in a fall during a practice. Never mind the countless broken nails – we realized from the start that this was not the most ‘glamorous’ of sports!



I am certain that the Washington's Birthday Match has rarely seen such diverse teams. But on February 12, we WERE a team. A team

of 12 – a love of the sport our only common factor. Some of us shot well during the match, some of us didn't, but we ALL had lots of fun! Each came to this event with individual goals and expectations, and each realized all that and more – including improved scores, new friends, and pride in our accomplishments. We love wearing our High Power Rifle Team shirts around town!

The surprising thing is – it isn't over. Several plan to purchase their own AR's. We plan to continue practicing. We plan to continue to frequent the high-power ranges and matches. And we plan to continue the tradition of teaching others so that they too will come to love this sport as much as we do. More teams next year? Why not!

WHAT A RIDE

When I first attended an A.S.R.P.A. meeting back in 1976, I was looking for some sympathetic fellow shooters who might be willing to recognize a new and maverick pistol sport called “practical shooting.” It had no regular course of fire, was fired from various distances and employed a scoring system that needed a calculator to figure.

Ben Avery had suggested I attend along with some of the shooters doing the new thing. We proposed a new division and were quickly approved, partly because Conventional Pistol Division was a little bewildered at a sport that the N.R.A. didn't even have rules for. But I saw something else.

A.S.R.P.A. was stalled by an attitude that all local politics would be taken care of by the N.R.A. and Ben Avery. Ben was getting on in years, politics in Arizona were changing at light speed, and the N.R.A. had their hands completely full of nationwide issues and internal politics. On top of that, the shooting sports were growing outside as well as inside the N.R.A.

In the next couple of years we worked to establish divisions for Pistol Silhouette, Education and Training, and Legislative affairs. I chaired each of these and was appointed to serve on the N.R.A. Silhouette Committee where I wrote the first set of rules and then sat on the Practical Shooting ad hoc committee and then on the Action Shooting Committee where I again got to write a new set of rules for that sport.

A couple of terms as Vice President of the association under Wayne Owens and Jim Jones opened my eyes to the tasks we would face in Arizona as we lost the considerable influence of Ben Avery and we gained hundreds of thousands of new residents. My first term as President was a learning experience. So was my second; and my third. And all the ones right up to my last. During those twenty years my fellow officers and I strived to be the voice for many Arizona gun owners as well as the membership of the Association. We passed pre-emption law in our state so that we would not become a patchwork of contradictory gun laws. A decade later we passed it again when a judge twisted the wording to allow precisely what the original law was passed to avoid. Now it is stronger and more explicit.

We worked for years to come up with a Concealed Carry Law after realizing that the simple idea of repealing the law against concealed carry was too complex to pass. During all the legal battles

it became increasingly and painfully clear that our opponents were fabricating statistics and painting bloody pictures of a “reality” that we knew was false.

After ten successful years of concealed carry in Arizona; after proving that law abiding armed citizens are a deterrent to crime and not a cause, the same arguments are being raised in the few states that have yet to pass CCW.

As we have always known the goal of the anti-rights activists is to deprive all citizens of a right which has recently and mercifully been acknowledged as an individual right by the nation's Attorney General. The right to arms. Not the privilege to be armed.

Twenty years and many battles convinced me that our freedom is won daily. The fight never ends. You cannot name a freedom that is not under constant attack. The freedom of our fellow citizens must be defended as well as our own. Any government that says they will protect us is lying. We are the protectors. Our sons and daughters are the “armed services” and our willingness to die rather than be enslaved is the only thing standing between oppression from outside or inside our country.

Things like the “Patriot Act” disturb me deeply. When the government says we must sacrifice freedom to get security my BS detector goes off the scale. When the right to privacy is negotiable we are being enslaved. My experience in the firearms rights arena has firmly convinced me that the fight is much larger.

I am a scout in that war and I'll be reporting back to you on a regular basis.

A.S.R.P.A.'s “new” President, Landis Aden, came on board in 1984 and has shared the ride with me. We will continue to collaborate now that he is at the helm. Our connection with the N.R.A. is strong and viable. Our dedication is unshakeable, but our strength is you.

We need to build the Association to meet the needs of this new century. The most common
